
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Upcoming Meetings

Well now there's hope since genealogists from beginner to advanced are employing new research methodologies and documentation practices. Follow genealogist Thomas MacEntee as he basically starts his genealogy research from scratch but includes sound

research practices and methodologies as well as new templates, tools, and the latest technology to create a better body of family history research.

October 2019 Recap

At our October meeting, Maria Beiter-Tucker, the Visitor Center Manager at Quabbin Reservoir, presented *Exploring the History of The Quabbin Valley Through Gravestones*.

Maria took our members on a virtual walk through the Quabbin Park Cemetery to explore the history of the former Swift River Valley towns and some of its residents. The Quabbin Park Cemetery was developed in the early 1930s for the reinterment of those who were buried in cemeteries in the flooded towns of Dana, Enfield, Greenwich, and Prescott. Nearly 8,000 graves were moved from the four towns' 34 cemeteries, but not every family chose to have their ancestors buried in the newly created cemetery. Maria then explained to us what happened to them.

Maria's presentation provided resources to help you locate ancestors who lived in the Swift River Valley. Whether or not you have ancestors who lived there, her presentation was intriguing for anyone with Massachusetts roots.

Research the Known

We all have ancestral mysteries that we want to figure out. Sometimes the best way to get insight into our "confusing people" is to go back and work on the ones that are already done or that we think are already done. That review may cause us to learn about new approaches or sources or remind us of things that we've forgotten.

Many of my maternal families are well-documented in the United States. Double checking that information in vital records, land records, probate records, court records, etc. has confirmed most of what I was told. I learned a few new facts about them and corrected some errors. That's good.

But it did more than that.

Those searches taught me more about all those records. It helped me to understand those records better. It helped me to see how to use those records better. That helped me when searching for those records for individuals where I "didn't know as much."

And reviewing the lives of those families; their migrations; their interactions with local government, state, and federal governments; their church memberships; their interactions with their neighbors; how the family spread out (or didn't); etc. gave me ideas on my more confusing ancestors.

Building your skills on people you think you know can help you research those you know that you don't.

Finding Ancestors on Facebook

Feeling hesitant about using Facebook for your family tree? Let me share an experience that brought down a brick wall and connected me to long-lost relatives I now stay in touch with.

Over the years, I've used Facebook in a number of ways for genealogy. I've gotten help from local historical societies, libraries, and discussion groups for certain locations (upstate New York, for example) and time periods, like the Great Migration.

But perhaps the simplest way I've used Facebook to learn more about my tree started with a direct message.

I'd been researching my Dad's maternal side in central Maine, specifically the Pond family. My greatgrandmother was Minnie Pond Beane, and I see her father in census records, but beyond that, I am stuck. There are some clues that the family might have been Loyalists that moved from South Carolina to New Brunswick, Canada. But I haven't confirmed that.

Minnie's daughter, my grandmother Gladys Beane Mason, had an older sister, Florence, whom I met several times as a child. Every family trip to Maine included a visit to Aunt Florence. On the way, we crossed the Piscataquis River on a covered bridge that I was deathly afraid of. (I was convinced that we would fall off the other side until my father gently took my hand and walked me to the end, proving that the road did continue.)

My grandmother died when I was 9. For some reason, my family lost touch with Florence. We didn't know when she passed away, and we knew little about her children and grandchildren.

Decades later, in 2015, I was searching online for Minnie. On one site, I noticed a post from a woman whose name included Florence's married surname. I figured it had to be a relative, so I did some more digging and found her on Facebook.

Now came the awkward part. Should I contact her? Would she mind being sought out by a stranger out of the blue?

So I started with the usual, "Um..hi...you don't know me, but...."

Soon after I got a response. She was Florence's granddaughter!

Over time, I got to know other members of Florence's family and was invited to join a Facebook group for that branch. Brick walls quickly collapsed as group members generously shared their research. I was happy to post photos, records, and autograph book pages that they had never seen before.

But perhaps the best part was the messages I received. Many members of the group remembered my grandmother. She was called "Aunt Gladdie." Her house in Abbot Village had a summer kitchen. She was a lot of fun!

I thanked everyone, telling them my family had always wondered what happened to Florence and her family.

"We'd been wondering about your family, too, Joanne," one wrote back.

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Was that Really Her Maiden Name?

Inward – Outward Commons

William Brooks had a problem. His problem was property. Real estate. How could he possibly use his real estate! As it was the year 1685, Mr Brooks had just been allotted his share of the "Outward Commons" of the town of Springfield.

Actually, he had received five shares – each one about four miles long and eight feet nine inches wide! He could maybe pitch a very small tent, but if he were a restless sleeper he might trespass on his neighbor's land! Moreover, his shares were not that close to each other, one being in Wilbraham, one in Hampden, plus two on the west side of the Connecticut River, probably in Westfield and Southwick!

For when Springfield had been first settled 49 years previously, the town was about 25 miles square, bisected by the Connecticut River, with the southern border about five miles south of the present Connecticut line. The lands near the river were called the "Inward Commons" and the two outward strips of the square, one on the west and one on the east, were called the "Outward Commons." Almost fifty years after the settlement the outward lands still had not been assigned to individuals. So, Sir Edmund Andros, governor of Massachusetts, ordered that unless it was speedily divided, the land would revert to the king. The colonists did some fast arithmetic. The eastern section was roughly 12 miles from north to south, 4 miles from east to west, while the western section was a little less. So that everyone would presumably have some chance at the best land, the "Outward Commons" on the east was divided into three sections, and that on the west into two sections. One strip in each was reserved for the ministry, one for the schools and the rest was divided among the 123 heads of families. Each strip was about four miles across. The width was estimated by the "estate and number of poll" in each family. Each son, whatever his age was (Women's Libbers, tak note) counted as a poll. This gave the Pynchon family, for instance, five strips 133 rods wide while poor Mr. Brooks (who must have had neither property nor sons) had to make do with five strips eight feet nine inches wide!

Of course, the purpose of this allotment was to quickly foil Governor Andros and subsequent swapping and selling no doubt gave everyone a practical piece of land. At least he had a choice of five locations!

We do not know how Mr. Brooks actually solved his problem, but we do know that some of Deacon Samuel Chapin's family reserved some of their share in Hampden, for members of the family are still living on it, while Margaret Bliss' descendants still own some of her Hampden share.

In the Academy Hall Museum of Hampden, there hangs on the wall a five-foot map of the town showing all of the original "Outward Commons" strips numbered.

Mr. Clifford Attleton recently gave to the Western Massachusetts Genealogical Society a map showing those strips in Wilbraham and Hampden. Frances Stockton Jones, #38
