### February 2021 Meeting



We're excited that Michael John Neill will be joining us again at our February meeting. Michael's presentation to us last May on **Researching the Entire Family** was so well-received that we've asked him to return. Michael will be presenting another live webinar titled "What It Does Not Say." Many times, a record only scratches the surface of what was going on when that record was created. This lecture looks at why a record was created and how state statute, common practice, economic situations, family issues, and other factors may be the "real story" behind any document. Michael will also discuss how to determine (when possible) what those "unwritten" issues were.

Michael has been an active genealogical researcher since the early 1980s and has researched his or his children's families in most states east of the Mississippi River and several European countries. He has lectured nationally, gives day-long seminars, and regularly leads research trips to the Family History Library in Salt Lake City and the Allen County Public Library in Ft. Wayne, Indiana.

Michael has a master's degree in mathematics and has been on the math faculty of Carl Sandburg College in Illinois since the early 1990s. His research interests include methodology, land records, the immigrant experience, chain migration, and researching female ancestors.

In addition to hosting, several blogs and Facebook sites, including <u>Rootdig</u> and <u>Genealogy Tip of the Day</u>, Michael has recently published a collection of his most popular daily tips titled *Genealogy Tip of the Day*. It's a must read for all genealogists – guaranteed that you'll learn something new.

# **New Date for Postponed Presentation by Thomas MacEntee**



We've rescheduled our January 6th presentation that was postponed because of the events at the Capitol. Thomas MacEntee will now be presenting "Don't Chop Off That Branch! A Genealogy Arborist's Handbook" on Wednesday, May 5th, 2021 at 6 PM EST.

We extend our thanks to Thomas for graciously offering to postpone his presentation so that members could follow the events in Washington, DC.

## **NERGC Conference Participation Decision**

When the decision was made to convert the NERGC 2021 conference to a virtual event, new participation agreements were needed from NERGC consortium members. Although WMGS signed the original participation agreement as one of the sponsoring societies for the conference in Springfield, the board unanimously voted not to sign the new participation agreement for the virtual conference. The board carefully deliberated the risks and benefits involved and decided that the risks of signing were too great for WMGS.

NERGC is a consortium of New England genealogy societies. WMGS participated as a sponsor in 2017 and 2019. The participation agreement includes a requirement to help with the work involved to produce the conference. Each society chairs a committee which requires many hours of volunteer work. In addition, societies are required to provide another 25 hours of volunteer time during the conference.

In exchange, societies that sign the agreement share in any profits. WMGS benefited by earning approximately \$2000 in each of the past two conferences. That certainly was a wonderful addition to our budget.

However, sponsoring societies must also share in making up any deficits incurred by the conference. Since preliminary expense figures for producing a virtual conference were very high with no guarantee of a profit, our Board felt that the risks were too great for our society. A large deficit might put our financial situation at risk.

We are sitting out the 2021 virtual conference, but we will consider participating again in 2023.

We encourage our members to sign up for the NERGC 2021 virtual conference and to consider volunteering their time. (See the advertisement below.)

### RootsTech Connect 2021

RootsTech Connect is free in 2021!



For the first time ever, RootsTech, the annual family history conference sponsored by FamilySearch, will take place completely online. Usually, RootsTech is a 4-day event held annually in Salt Lake City, Utah. However, because of the pandemic, the entire event will be held virtually from February 25th-27th, 2021. Incredibly, it will be completely **free** this year!

RootsTech Connect 2021 will offer a combination of both livestream and on-demand content to participants from around the world. For the three days of the online event, attendees will have the opportunity to interact with speakers, exhibitors, and fellow attendees through live-chat and question & answer opportunities. Because of the differences in time zones, sessions will also be available to view on-demand after the

conference concludes. Even better, sessions will be available for viewing for at least a whole year!

Roots Tech Connect 2021 will feature keynote speakers, dozens of classes, and over 300 breakout sessions, along with a virtual expo hall marketplace that you can visit from home. This is the largest family history conference in the world and you don't have to even travel to participate in it.

### **How Did Your Ancestors Meet?**

In honor of Valentine's Day, we asked WMGS members to share stories describing how their ancestors met. We heartily thank everyone who responded!

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My parents, Theresa Dorval (Marie Ange Amanda Jeanette Therese Dorval) and Raymond Lapierre, met in 1950 at the Roseland Ballroom in Holyoke. Mom said it was love at first sight. My Dad asked her if she would be back the next week. Coyly, she replied "Maybe, we'll see." The next weekend he spent the entire night dancing with her, and she told him that if he was going to dance every dance with her, he would have to pay her way in. I'm not sure if he paid her way in, but he did find his way into her heart. They were married on July 10, 1954 and were married for 61 years.

My parents met at the Valley Arena in Holyoke, a venue similar to our civic centers of today. My father was a soda vendor working in the aisles, the same exact job as we see today except he had to carry heavy wooden crates with glass bottles. It was bingo night, 1938, and he finally got the courage to hand my mother an orange soda as he ran down the aisle. She smiled. Two years later they were married and eventually celebrated 52 years together. Whenever I ordered an orange soda my mother would always say "Orange is my favorite flavor, do you know why?"

We've always wondered how my husband's parents met. Henry Leblond and Rita Breault were married on June 24, 1939 at Assumption Church in Chicopee, where Rita and her family were living. Henry and his family were living in Holyoke. He was 28 and she was 21.

Both of my husband's parents died when they were in their 40s and none of their children knew how they met. By the time I became interested in genealogy and started asking my husband's aunts and uncles, no one could tell me for sure, except one aunt said that Henry's car broke down in front of Rita's house, and she came out to check what was happening.

That story didn't seem plausible, because Henry didn't get his license and his first car until the early 1950s. No one else in either family had a car at that time either.


When the series of WWII Draft Cards for Young Men, 1940-1947 were released last year, I started researching all of the men in both families. I discovered that both Rita's father and Henry's older brother listed that they were working at the Farr Alpaca Co. in Holyoke when they signed their cards. Could some matchmaking have been involved? We'll never know for sure.

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I read that my 5<sup>th</sup> great-grandparents, Isaac Herrick, Jr. and Olive(t) Worthington, met when he was traveling from Preston, Connecticut to settle in Worthington, Massachusetts, where he had been granted some land from a relative. He stopped by a Worthington Tavern in what is modern-day Agawam, where Olive was working. (I don't think her surname was related to the name of the town, however.) They married in Brimfield on September 3, 1771 and settled in Worthington, carrying her belongings through a river on horseback. I still need to do more research on this couple, and I still haven't found any more information about Worthington Tavern, but I'm eager to learn more!

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## Golden Rules of Genealogy

1. There is No Easy Button in Genealogy. You will work hard to find your ancestors. Genealogy will require more than passion; it will require skills, smarts, and dedication. Don't believe the hype of instant hints, smart matches and shaky leaves. If it were that easy, the journey of discovering our roots would have little or no meaning.



- 2. Research from a Place of "I Don't Know." Your genealogy research will likely run counter to your cherished family stories. It will upend your preconceived notions about certain events and people. It will change the way you think about your ancestors. This can only happen if you research with an open mind and take off the blinders.
- 3. Track Your Work and Cite Your Sources. When I started out in genealogy, I'll admit I was a name collector and would "dump" almost any name into my database. Years later, I am crossing out entire branches of a tree that never really should have been "grafted" on to mine. Use a research log, track your work, cite your sources, and analyze data before it is entered into any software or online family tree program.
- 4. **Ask for Help**. The genealogy community is populated with people of all skill levels and areas of expertise, most of whom want to assist others. There are no stupid questions; we all started as beginners. There is no right way to ask. Post a query on Facebook or ask a question during a webinar or email your favorite genealogy rock star.
- 5. You Can't Edit a Blank Page. Which means: you have to start in order to have something to work with. That project you keep putting off, like publishing your family history, won't complete itself. Commit yourself to move from "obsession" to "reality." Remember: A year from now, you'll wish you had started today.
- 6. Work and Think Like Your Ancestors. While I'm not sure about your ancestors, mine were resourceful and developed tools and skills to get what they wanted. They were not "educated" per se, but they had "street smarts" and knew where to go so they could learn new things. Also make sure you have a plan; my ancestors didn't just wake up one day and on a whim decide to come to America and make a better life. They had a plan, they had a network of people to help them, and they made it happen.
- 7. You Do Not Own Your Ancestors. Researching your roots can create emotional connections to not only your ancestors, but to the actual research itself. Many people become "possessive" of their ancestors and fail to realize that a 3rd great-grandparent is likely the ancestor of hundreds of others. You can't take your research or your ancestor with you when you die; take time to share your research and be open to differences in information and research when collaborating with others.
- 8. **Be Nice. The Genealogy Community is a Small Place.** While there are millions of people searching for ancestors, genealogists worldwide have developed a community with relatively few degrees of separation. Whether it is online in a Facebook group or in-person at genealogy conference, it is likely you'll already know someone. Being "genealogy nice" is not fake; the connections with other researchers tend to be deep and genuine. We know that all of our roots are inter-locked and a genealogist can't always go it alone.
- 9. Give and Be Abundant. Exchange information freely with other researchers; don't hold data "close" to you or exchange it in lieu of something else. Most genealogists who have heard me speak know my own story of abundance: Don't let your hand keep a tight grip on information. Let it go. Once your hand is free, it can be open and ready to receive the next good thing coming your way.
