May 2021 Meeting



We're always excited when we have a visit by our good friend, nationally and internationally known Thomas MacEntee! We originally had this presentation scheduled for our January meeting, but Tom graciously offered to postpone his visit so that everyone could stay updated on the breaking news happening in our Capitol that day. In fact, we're going to have back-to-back visits from Tom, as he is also going to be joining us for our June meeting when he'll be presenting **"Backing Up Your Genealogy Data,"** a topic that many of you have asked us to address.

Tom, founder and CEO of High-Definition Genealogy, LLC, is the author of over 10 genealogy books and editor of over 100 publications. After spending more than 25 years in the information technology field, Tom branched off into genealogy education and marketing. Known as one of the most generous genealogists in the field, he shares many of his articles and videos for free through his <u>Genealogybargains.com</u> website and Facebook groups to keep us updated on the latest in genealogy education and offerings in the marketplace.

In May, Tom's topic will be **"Don't Chop Off That Branch! A Genealogy Arborist's Handbook."** Many of us will relate to this dilemma. You're at a crossroads when it comes to years of genealogy research: Should you delete an entire branch of your family tree due to faulty research? Or is there a better way to correct family history research errors and salvage information that took years to find? Tom will address the problem of bad research, help you decide if your research is bad or just sloppy, help you map out a correction plan, and help you salvage that branch.

We have two exciting presentations coming up with Brian Rhinehart, a professional genealogist specializing in the War of 1812, the Civil War, and research and record retrieval at the National Archives and other repositories.



May 20th – 7 PM – Navigating the Records from The War of 1812

From bounty land to pensions, there is no shortage of genealogical records for soldiers from the War of 1812. Learn how and why these records were created, how to make sense of them, and what those records can contain for your ancestors!

You'll learn about different types of records and where to find them, including bounty land records, pension and military service records, and more.

June 17th – 7 PM – Was My Ancestor in the Civil War?

Over ten percent of the US population fought in the Civil War in the 1860s. Was your ancestor one of them? Learn some tips on how to determine if your ancestor was in the Civil War, using (mostly) free resources.

These presentations are parts one and two of a three-part series. The third presentation, titled "I Have a Civil War Ancestor... Now What?" will be offered in the fall.





Brian Rhinehart is a graduate of Boston University's Certificate of Genealogy Research and the Genealogical Institute on Federal Records (GenFed) in Washington, D.C. He's attended the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh and has completed the ProGen (Professional Genealogy) Study Group.

A direct descendant of six Civil War soldiers, Brian specializes in Civil War and War of 1812 records at the National Archives in Washington, DC and has retrieved military files for hundreds of clients there.

Learn More With Ancestry Academy

Ancestry.com has a wealth of genealogical research bells and whistles, depending on the subscription you choose. But did you know you can access Ancestry Academy, the site's library of educational videos, for free?

I didn't realize this until I read Nancy Hendrickson's <u>"Ancestry.com for Free? 7 Ways to Research With No Subscription</u>" in the January/February 2021 issue of *Family Tree* magazine. There, you'll find a brief summary of what Ancestry Academy has to offer, but I thought it would be fun to delve even further.

Ancestry Academy divides its video library into 11 categories:

Five Minute Finds. This section is a grab bag of videos, all under five minutes long. Topics include census records, agricultural schedules, and tips for using Ancestry and its related sites, Fold3 and Find A Grave.

Researching Your Military Ancestors in the US. This section includes research videos for the Civil War, World War I, and the War of 1812. You'll also find videos on pension application files and tips for using Fold3, an Ancestry-related site.

<u>Newspapers.com.</u> Searching newspapers and obituaries for information about your ancestors? Check out this category. (Note: Newspapers.com is another Ancestry-related website.)

<u>Getting The Most Out Of Ancestry.</u> Even if you've been using Ancestry for years, there is always more to learn. In this section, you might find research paths you hadn't considered before.

<u>Researching a State.</u> This collection offers state-specific research information on Illinois, <u>Massachusetts</u>, Michigan, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Texas, Vermont, and Virginia.

<u>Researching Outside the United States.</u> Here, you'll find tips for researching English, Italian, Irish, German, and French-Canadian genealogy.

<u>Methodology and Skills.</u> Build your skills in a variety of areas, including African American research, Canadian records, church and religious records, cemetery information, and more.

Find a Grave. Learn more about this helpful cemetery resource (also related to Ancestry). You'll find out how to set up a Find a Grave account, add memorials, and edit your information.

<u>Understanding DNA.</u> What should genealogists know about DNA? Look here for videos on the science behind DNA testing and how to link the connections you make with your research.

Did You Know? This category offers videos on house histories, lineage societies, non-population schedules and more.

<u>Census Records.</u> Here, I enjoyed a series of videos called "Who is that Tick Mark? Using Early Census Records." It helped me understand all those slash marks on early census pages.

Within each topic listed above, you'll often find several more related videos. For example, the series "You Found What in the 1940 Census?" includes 14 videos, and "Mining Obituaries for New Evidence" offers 10.

Wherever you are in your genealogical journey, you're sure to find something of interest in Ancestry Academy.

Memorial Days Past

As remembered by Frances Jones, #38 and Gertrude Lyons, #132 Reprinted from the *American Elm*, Vol. 15, No. 1, Spring 1986

"Memorial Day! We used to call it 'Decoration Day' because on that day we children all carried bouquets to the 'Old Cemetery' or the 'New Cemetery' to decorate the graves of the soldiers of the Revolutionary and Civil Wars. We knew where to place our bunches of wild flowers for American flags had already been set in their iron markers."

"Of course, the preparation had been made weeks before when Miss Hooper or Miss Pease (later Mrs. Nelson Carew) had taught us 'Columbia, the Gem of the Ocean,' 'Tenting Tonight,' 'The Battle Cry of Freedom' and other Civil War songs and poems. Miss Pease reminded us that when her father was in the Union Army he had seen Lincoln, and Mrs. Shute, also a teacher, told how as a little girl she walked down the streets of Springfield, Illinois, holding Lincoln's hand!"



"The day before the exercises, we children went into the fields, to gather daisies, buttercups, and perhaps our neighbor's lilacs. White daffodils were usually ready too. We walked to the Village Green for the ceremonies held around the old Civil War canon, and Rev. C. B. Bliss was always on hand to take a photograph of the children – gay with their flowers, flags, and best clothes."

"After the First World War, the day became more formal as the American Legion took over the preparations, and by 1920, Charles

Henry Burleigh had presented to the town (Hampden, MA) the Soldier's Monument. During the Second World War, the canon was contributed to the war effort. A parade became part of the ceremony which now honors the veterans and Gold Star Mothers of all wars. For many years, Rep. William J. Sessions was our patriotic speaker."

"As more people come to live in and love our little town and the 'old timers' remember the days of just a few gathered together, shall we be glad that as we enjoy our family reunions, we can still take one day to remember those who came before."

May Virtual Tours & Offerings

Freedom Trail - Boston, MA

Take virtual tours of early Boston, including the Old South Meeting House, King's Chapel, Park Street Church, Paul Revere's house, King's Chapel Burial Grounds, Massachusetts State House, USS Constitution and its museum, the MA 54th Regiment Memorial, Faneuil Hall, Copp's Hill Burying Ground, Granary Burial Ground, Old North Church, and more.

Swift River Valley Historical Society – New Salem, MA

This society helps to preserve the history of the four towns which now lie beneath the Quabbin Reservoir - Dana, Prescott, Enfield, and Greenwich. Though the society does not have collections available online, the site contains links to many interesting videos, documentaries, old photographs, and oral histories of former inhabitants of these towns.

Maine State Archives Bicentennial Projects

The Maine Virtual Reality experience lets you tour several historical places in Maine, including the State House, Fort Knox State Historic Site, West Quoddy Heady Lighthouse and Park, and Old Fort Western in Augusta. Images and documents from the Maine State Archives relating to the state's history and an extensive list of historical material is included in its digital collections.
