## **July 2021 Meeting**



We're pleased that John Putnam will join us again to present "Peopling Colonial New England: 1620-1787," the third lecture in his New England series.

From several small coastal settlements in the early 17th century, the early settlers and their descendants, as well as new immigrants, migrated to other parts of the New England frontier over the next 150 years. Many reasons led to these migrations, which infilled the settlement of most areas of New England by the time that the new Republic was established in 1787. As this presentation will demonstrate, there were many ebbs and flows in this process over this time period. Why should this matter to genealogists? If you

had ancestors in this region, this presentation will help you understand why your ancestors were part of this dynamic process, where and how to look for your ancestors in this area, and how the population pressures in colonial New England continually pushed the borders outward. If your ancestors lived elsewhere, this New England settlement model became a template for the future development of the rest of the country and fueled the settlement of many areas of the remaining U.S.

A native of Western Mass, John grew up on a farm in Southwick, graduated from UMass Amherst, and earned a master's degree in political science from the University of Colorado. He now resides in Colorado. He's the past president of the Pikes Peak Genealogical Society, a fascinating speaker, and a 12<sup>th</sup>-generation American! Join us on **Wednesday**, **July 7th at 6 p.m.** for a virtual presentation via Zoom!

## June 17th – 7 p.m. – Was My Ancestor in the Civil War?

We're very happy that Brian Rhinehart will be back with us for another session on researching ancestors who served our country. If you missed his presentation, "Navigating Records from The War of 1812," the recording will be available in the Members Only section of our website until June 20th.



On June 17<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m., Brian will present "Was My Ancestor in the Civil War?"

Over 10% of the U.S. population fought in the Civil War in the 1860s. Was your ancestor one of them? Learn some tips on how to determine if your ancestor was in the Civil War, using (mostly) free resources.

This presentation is part one of a three-part series. The third presentation, titled "I Have a Civil War Ancestor... Now What?" will be offered in the fall.



Brian Rhinehart is a graduate of Boston University's Certificate of Genealogy Research and the Genealogical Institute on Federal Records (GenFed) in Washington, D.C. He's attended the Genealogical Research Institute of Pittsburgh and has completed the ProGen (Professional Genealogy) Study Group.

A direct descendant of six Civil War soldiers, Brian specializes in Civil War and War of 1812 records at the National Archives in Washington, D.C. and has retrieved military files for hundreds of clients there.

# **Annual Meeting Recap 2021**

Our annual meeting was held virtually on May 5th following our presentation by Thomas MacEntee.



Following the Treasurer's Summary and Report on Membership presented by Deb Woodford, Treasurer, our annual elections were held. The Nominating Committee included Dave Lapierre, Chairperson; Dorothy Cichonski, Secretary; and Jeanne Lockhart, Assistant Treasurer. After describing the role of the Nominating Committee and its process for selecting candidates, Dave presented the slate of nominees for election to terms that will expire at the May 2023 annual meeting.

The proposed slate included:

- Jeanne Leblond, President
- Deborah Woodford, Treasurer
- Joanne Mason, Director
- Cara Seitchek, Director

No nominations were offered from the floor. Voting was conducted by anonymous electronic Zoom polling. The slate was unanimously approved by those members in attendance.

Both Dave Lapierre and Jeanne Leblond, President, congratulated those members reelected or elected to the board for the first time. Both also thanked Hillary Schau and Terry Pearsons, directors who chose not to run for reelection, for their service to the board. We will miss them on the board, but we're confident that they'll stay involved in WMGS.

A brief report on the status of WMGS over the past year was presented by Jeanne Leblond. She noted that WMGS needed to quickly transition to operating virtually, but has had a successful year despite the challenges.

#### Announcements included:

- Our annual audit, which we were unable to complete last year because of the quarantine, will be completed later this spring. For safety reasons, it may be necessary to conduct the audit in an outdoor facility, as most libraries and meeting venues are still not open. An auditing committee will be appointed at the June board meeting.
- Our Founders Award has been postponed until we can return to live meetings.

- No information is available on when the Agawam Senior Center will reopen and whether we will be able to reserve rooms. We anticipate that when the senior center reopens to their members, it will take some time before community members are welcomed into the facility.
- The board is working on a policy for operating in a hybrid format with events held both live and virtually when we return to normal activity. There are many issues to be resolved including, but not limited to, speakers' contracts needing to be modified, equipment needs, Wi-Fi capabilities at the senior center, and having enough volunteers trained in the needed technology.
- A new Members Only Facebook page will be coming sometime in the next few months. It will be an additional member benefit and will be a place where members can communicate with each other, share information, ask for assistance from other members, post queries, and share discoveries. It will also provide WMGS and our members a place to post information on coming events that we learn about between meetings.
- WMGS will be celebrating its 50th anniversary next year. A committee will be set up to discuss options for celebrating the event, which will hopefully include completing a history of our society.
- The meeting ended with a raffle for those in attendance. WMGS was fortunate to earn a raffle prize from the Southern California Genealogical Society for their jamboree to be held virtually on June 11th & 12th, as we completed the requirements to advertise their event. This was a marketing effort conducted to advertise their conference to genealogy society members across the country. A virtual "wheel of fortune" with names of attendees was used. Joanie Bonner was selected as the lucky winner! She'll be able to attend live lectures on those days and access 20 recorded webinars of her choice through October 10th, 2021.

# <u>Daniel Gates Merritt</u> – <u>Letters from the Civil War</u>




I knew I had a few Civil War soldiers in my family tree, and today I was able to put a name with — well, not a face — but some handwriting and some stories.

Daniel Gates Merritt was my 4th great-uncle. Born in Patterson, New York in 1841, he entered the military in September 1864. On April 25, 1865, he was in Petersburg, Virginia, writing home to his parents, William and Esther Jane (Mabie) Merritt.

Here are some snippets. Please note that I have retained Daniel's spelling and grammar:




Dear mother and brothers me and Theodore is well and hope these few lines will find you all the same. [Daniel had an older brother named Theodore, but I don't know if his brother is the same Theodore mentioned.]



I think we will get home by the forth of July. I hope we may.

#### He also wrote:

There is plenty of tobacco hear where we are. It is a tobacco factory. There is over 2 ton of leaf hear now. The boys has had all the plug tobacco they wanted.



I'm not sure whether Daniel made it home by the Fourth of July, but he was mustered out of military service on July 13th, so he was probably close. Sadly, he passed away in 1869, a few weeks before his 28th birthday. As I read this letter, I realized that it was written just ten days after President Lincoln was assassinated. On the day it was written, Lincoln's funeral train was traveling through Daniel's home region in New York, heading up the east side of the Hudson River. It passed through Tarrytown, the place of Daniel's enlistment, to Albany, before it swung due west on its way to Springfield, Illinois.

Also on that day, John Wilkes Booth was hiding out at a farm about 75 miles away. He was killed on April 26th.

And Daniel's newborn niece, Carrie Jane Cowl, was just two days old. She grew up to become my great-great grandmother.

# An Evening with John D. "Jack" Warner, Ph.D. Archivist of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts



Wednesday, June 30, 2021 at 7:00 P.M. EDT via Zoom

John D. "Jack" Warner, Ph.D., Archivist of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, will discuss how to access the records and artifacts held at the Massachusetts State Archives; how records become part of the Massachusetts Archives Digital Repository; how his work with the State Historical Records Advisory Board affects future resources; and how you can get involved at the Archives.

If we analyze Dr. Warner's current responsibilities, you can see his impact on records preservation and access, both of keen interest to genealogists:

- Dr. Warner's involvement with the Massachusetts Archives Digital
- In his role as State Historical Records Coordinator, he leads the Massachusetts State Historical Records Advisory Board (SHRAD) in strategic planning, grants programs and records preservation.
- Repository makes this presentation valuable to genealogists across the country.
- He leads the Records Management Unit of the Secretary of State's Office, which oversees records
  management for all state agencies as well as city and town clerks. The working documents of today are the
  resources of tomorrow.
