August 2021 Meeting



We had such a great response to Marian Pierre-Louis' presentation to WMGS last March that we've asked her back for another visit. This time, she'll be presenting "Warning Out and Settlement Law in Early New England." Come find out about "strangers taken in" records, "warning out" records, and settlement law. Settlement law impacted all New Englanders whether rich or poor, transient or long-time resident. Discover what records were created as a result and why. You will be surprised at the level of detail you can find about your ancestors. Marian Pierre-Louis will take you into the depths of these rarely discussed New England records to reveal a wealth of information about your ancestors.

Marian Pierre-Louis is a genealogy professional who specializes in educational outreach through webinars, internet broadcasts, and video. Her areas of expertise include house history research, southern New England research, and solving brick walls. Since the rise in interest of genetic genealogy Marian has become addicted to using DNA to help solve genealogy mysteries. Marian is the host of the Genealogy Professional Podcast. She has also produced and hosted 100 episodes of Fieldstone Common, a history podcast. Marian is the Online Education Producer for Legacy Family Tree Webinars where she produces online genealogy education classes. Once a month you'll find her as the evening host of Legacy Family Tree Webinars.

September 2021 Meeting



We are kicking off our 2021-2022 membership year with a fantastic presentation by Lisa A. Alzo!

Lisa will be presenting a lecture titled "Navigating Naturalization Records," a difficult area of research for many of us. First papers, petitions, certificates, and registrations are some of the key documents for naturalization – the process of becoming an American citizen. Due to changing laws and an evolving process over time, locating the appropriate official paperwork can be a challenging task for family historians. Lisa will explain how to navigate naturalization records and what information they contain about your ancestors.

For those of you who haven't met her, Lisa A. Alzo is a freelance writer, instructor, and internationally recognized lecturer who specializes in researching Eastern European genealogy, writing family history, and using the internet to trace female and immigrant ancestors. She grew up in Duquesne, Pennsylvania and earned a Bachelor of Science degree in nutrition from West Virginia Wesleyan College in 1987 and a Master of Fine Arts degree in nonfiction writing from the University of Pittsburgh in 1997.

Lisa is the author of eleven books, including *The Family Tree Polish, Czech and Slovak Genealogy Guide* and the award-winning *Three Slovak Women*. She has also written hundreds of magazine articles. She is a contributing editor for *Family Tree* magazine and works as an online educator and writing coach through her website Research, Write, Connect. She also developed the Eastern European Research Certificate Program for the National Institute for Genealogical Studies. Lisa is a frequently invited speaker for national conferences, genealogical and historical societies, and webinars. An avid genealogist for more than 30 years, Lisa also chronicles her family history adventures on her blog The Accidental Genealogist. We're thrilled that Lisa will be presenting to us!

Even though the lure of outdoor activities is there, August is a perfect time to work on genealogy projects. Whether the weather is too hot or stormy to be outside, or your favorite archive or venue isn't open, there are still lots of options available. Need some ideas?

Now that we can visit in person if everyone is vaccinated, consider visiting an older relative to interview them about their family memories. They'll love to see you, and you'll get some family tidbits.



Visit a place where your ancestors lived and take photos of the surroundings. Maybe even take the grandkids with you. Then write up your ancestors' story and use the photos to illustrate it. I visited the tiny town of Hardwick, where my husband's great-grandparents worked in a mill. Their marriage record indicated that they were married in 1872 in a French-Canadian church in Ware, but lived in Hardwick. They likely traveled to Ware, which is about 8 miles away via train, so I took pictures of the tiny train station, the abandoned mill where they may have worked, and the workers' housing along the main road. This couple was a brick wall for a long time, until I found their marriage record, listing Zephirin Mochon as Jefferson Murphy and his bride, Josephine Dubois, as Josephine Woods.

If you're trying to beat the heat outdoors, it's never too early to start working on genealogy gifts for Christmas. Ornaments using family photos or picture books of some ancestors perhaps?

Not into crafts? Make your grandmother's blueberry, raspberry, or peach pie recipe!



Summer Reading List Suggestions

Do you know someone who's found unexpected results in their DNA report? Has it happened to you? Or do you know an adoptee who is searching for their birth family?

With the popularity of inexpensive DNA tests and the increasing number of results being posted on major DNA websites, it's become quite common to find unexpected results. Whether it's a newfound sibling, cousin, niece, nephew, parent, or grandparent or a story that you didn't expect about your adoption, you or someone you know may have been stunned by the results of a DNA test.


The books in this list help to not only give us insight into the strategies and techniques used to find answers, but also help to give us some perspective on some of the psychological issues and challenges connected with these discoveries.



Finding Family: My Search for Roots and the Secrets in My DNA by Richard Hill, self-published in 2012, published by Familius in 2017

One of the first accounts written by an adoptee trying to search for the truth of why he was given up for adoption, this story made the pages of the Wall Street Journal. Richard Hill learned that he was adopted at age 18, when his family doctor let the secret slip out. Sealed records and family secrets thwarted his efforts, but using old-fashioned genealogy sleuthing, he uncovered potential new family members. But the connections didn't tell the whole story until the

advent of DNA testing and the new field of genetic genealogy. Even then, there were twists and turns. Hill takes us along his journey to find his biological family and shares his guidance and insight about the techniques he used, including DNA testing, adoption networks, and methods to bypass sealed records. Reading like a good mystery novel, Hill's story shares the knowledge he gained to help others, not only through this book, but also through a helpful website and genealogy guide.




The Stranger in My Genes: A Memoir by Bill Griffeth, 2016, New England Historic Genealogical Society, Boston, MA

Bill Griffeth, well-known television anchor on CNBC, had shared his genealogy hobby for years with a cousin. After being encouraged to take a DNA test with his cousin in 2012 to learn about their shared ancestral roots, he was stunned to learn that the man who raised him was not biologically related to him. Bill describes the visceral and emotional reactions that shook his entire world to the core. Following his discovery, Bill wrestled with whether to pursue the truth with his elderly mother and how to convince her that he indeed still loved her.



The Lost Family by Libby Copeland, 2020, Abrams Press, New York

For most amateur genealogists, purchasing a home DNA test is just an enjoyable exercise that leads to knowledge about our ethnicity. Most often, we purchase the tests without understanding what the possible ramifications of the results might be. But are we prepared for unexpected results that challenge everything we think we know about our family? Are we aware that submitting our DNA sample might lead to an emotional journey that often leads to long-buried family secrets? Libby Copeland combines her personal story with an analysis of the genetic genealogy movement and its ramifications on both society and family relations.




Too Brown to Keep, A Search for Love, Forgiveness, and Healing by Judy Fambrough-Billingsley, self-published, 2019

Judy Farmbrough-Billingsley has written a touching account of her journey of discovery of her birth family. She learns that she is both an international and biracial adoptee, as her father was a Black American soldier and her mother was a white German woman. After her father's return to the United States, Judy and her sister were abandoned in a foreign orphanage by their mother. Both she and her sister were adopted through an international agency by a childless California couple who provided them with the love and family they needed. Judy's search for her birth parents required that she overcome her feelings of abandonment and grief, but it also required that she learn

about the racism that led to her being rejected by her German family.


The author includes a helpful chapter on forgiveness and healing, along with a guide to researching and connecting with birth families.



Inheritance: A Memoir of Genealogy, Paternity and Love by Dani Shapiro, 2019, A Borzoi Book published by Alfred A. Knopf, NY

After receiving results of DNA tests that the author and her husband took to explore their heritage, Dani Shapiro was shaken to the core when she discovered that she was only half-Ashkenazi Jewish. Stunned to learn that the father that she loved and adored was not her birth father, Dani begins to search for her birth father and tries to find out why her parents never told her about the circumstances of her birth. How do you form some type of bond with your biological father who was only a struggling student performing what he thought was a helpful gesture? The advent of fertility treatments has proven to be a scientific wonder for many families, but no one anticipated what would happen years later when DNA tests would be freely

available. This book is a *New York Times*, *Los Angeles Times*, *Boston Globe*, *Wall Street Journal*, and National Indie bestseller!



Ethical Dilemmas in Genealogy by Penny Walters, Ph.D., 2019, independently published

Do you want to learn more about the ethical questions that surround genealogy research and DNA research? Are you struggling with what to tell family members about your genealogical discoveries? Perhaps you're trying to decide whether you should even purchase a DNA test kit, wondering what you'll find and how you'll handle any unexpected results. Or perhaps you'd like to explore a scholarly analysis of the ethics behind the genealogical DNA test movement. If so, this book deserves a spot on your bookshelf.
